


INTERVIEW WITH THE DOCTOR



P: Good Afternoon, doctor.

D: Greasy food affects you?

P: Yes. At home we eat a lot of greasy food.

D: Where in the abdomen does it hurt? Point please! Does the pain travel to your chest, shoulder, back or across your abdomen?

P: It hurts in the middle. Sometimes, the pain travels across my abdomen.

D: Besides the pain, you said you have heartburn?

P: Yes, after a burp, I feel a kind of sour taste.

TWO WORDS FOR DOLOR

Dolor "ACHE"

achacar. (Del ár. hisp. *aččakká*, y este del ár. clás. *tašakkà*, quejarse, denunciar). **1.** tr. Atribuir, imputar a alguien o algo un delito, culpa, defecto o desgracia, generalmente con malicia o sin fundamento.

achaque. (De *achacar*). **1.** m. Indisposición o enfermedad habitual, especialmente las que acompañan a la vejez. **2.** m. Indisposición o enfermedad generalmente ligera. **3.** m. Vicio, defecto, tacha, tanto físico como moral.

panacea. (Del lat. *panacēa*, y este del gr. πανάκεια). **1.** f. Medicamento a que se atribuye eficacia para curar diversas enfermedades. **2.** f. Remedio o solución general para cualquier mal.

Function: *intransitive verb*

- STOMACHACHE: Dolor de estómago.
- BACKACHE: Dolor de espalda.
- TOOTHACHE: Dolor de muelas
- EARACHE: Dolor de oídos.
- HEADACHE.

The parts of the body are used in singular with no article except Headache that always adopts the undetermined one.

For problems with the Heart we use the expression Heart troubles.

Heartache is used in a figurative way to express a pain of love.

Dolor "Pain"

A pain is a suffering of mind or body. Feel some pain, a great deal of pain, cry with pain.

A pain killer is a medicine for lessening this particular or localized but persistent kind of body suffering: a pain in the knee, pains in the back, a pain in the neck, stomach pains, etc.
